## "Jenny Wiley - White Squaw"

A Dramatic monologue presented by Patsy Gaines

Jenny Wiley was captured by the Indians and then became a "White Squaw." She saw her brother and 5 children killed and scalped before her eyes. During her captivity, she became a "White Squaw" which included raising corn for the Indians, making clothes from animal skins and learning to cook a whole buffalo...all while the Indians watched but did not help. She was given a sign from God which she used for her escape to her home where she raised another five children. The Jenny Wiley Kentucky State Park is named for her.

Patsy Johnson Gaines is a storyteller of history doing her own research, writing her own material and appearing in appropriate costumes for each of her characters. Her goal is to make history come 'alive' to the audience. She was born and raised on a farm in Southern Illinois where she attended a one room school. She attended Southern Illinois University and Madison, Wisconsin Business College. She is a widow with 3 children and 4 grandchildren.



Patsy is active in the Daughters of the American Revolution having served as Ohio's State Regent. She is a member of the United Daughters of the Confederacy, Daughters of the Union, Ohio State Regent of the Daughters of American Colonists as well as Regent of the local Daughters of the American Colonists Chapter and President of the local Colonial Dames 17th Century Chapter and Vice-President of the Daughters of 1812 local Chapter.

She has received numerous recognitions for her service to the Wyoming Presbyterian Church, her community in Wyoming, Ohio, the Cincinnati Art Museum and the Cincinnati Museum Center's Women's Committee where she served as a volunteer. She has twice been made a Kentucky Colonel.
